Funding for the PE and Sport Premium

Schools receive PE and sport premium funding based on the number of pupils in years 1 to 6.

How to use the PE and Sport Premium

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer.

This means that we should use the premium to:

- Develop or add to the PE and sport activities that your school already offers
- Make improvements now that will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

For example, we can use our funding to:

- Hire qualified sports coaches to work with teachers
- Provide existing staff with training or resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively
- Introduce new sports or activities and encourage more pupils to take up sport
- Support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs, holiday clubs and [Change4Life](#) clubs
- Run sport competitions
- Increase pupils' participation in the [School Games](#)
- Run sports activities with other schools

You should not use your funding to:-

- Employ coaches or specialist teachers to cover planning, preparation and assessment arrangements
- Teach the minimum requirements of the National Curriculum, including those specified for swimming

Vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium

ALL pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles.

2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement.
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. Increased participation in competitive sport
